Reflecting on the 2019 / 2020 Financial Year, we can't help but be influenced by how the year has ended. We don't yet know the longer-term effects of the upheaval and strains of COVID-19 and the associated lockdown, which remains in place as we write this report. The year ahead will surely be one of the most challenging for Sweet Louise. But it is one from which we are confident we will emerge even stronger.

In times of adversity, an organisation's purpose and its resilience is tested. Our members have again during the year, both humbled and energised us. As I look ahead, it is clear that our members will rely on us even more this year. That in turn requires innovative approaches to ensure we have the resources to deliver these services sustainably. With exciting new appointments into our fundraising team and our marvellous team of skilled Support Coordinators, the Sweet Louise team is the strongest it has ever been.

Sweet Louise will prove to be resilient because of the purpose we all believe in and the team who are dedicated and skilled at delivering on it. I thank you again for believing in us.







Marino Sherwin, now 57, was diagnosed with breast cancer at the age of 49. "When I was diagnosed with breast cancer I was still working," says Marino. "I was feeling well. At the time, I'd never felt fitter."

Marino's 12-year-old granddaughter, Isabella, lives with her full-time. Her daughter Zoe, Isabella's mother, has bipolar disorder and struggles with depression.

"I was able to get someone to do gardening and work around the house. They helped clear out my garage so I could set up an art



and helped me cope with the next phase of my life. Sweet Louise gave me peace of mind by taking some of the financial strain away. "Sweet Louise is my

strength. I haven't missed any member meetings, including the Zoom meetings.
The meetings bring hope, laughter and ideas. We laugh

and cry together.

"Nadine, my Support
Coordinator, is always there
to listen. She listens, and then
asks me how she can help. I
can say whatever I like and

know I will be heard without judgement. She gives time and warmth and I feel valued.

"I would like to say to all those who donate to Sweet Louise – I appreciate your support. I am so grateful. Your donations help me to live my life to the fullest. Even though we have a terminal illness, we can still have quality of life. Our life still

matters. We still matter. For me, the support has been life changing. What you give is huge."



Living it up with love and laughter

When we are called to be bridges

Lesley Narayanan is the Sweet Louise Support Coordinator for Canterbury, West Coast, Otago and Southlands regions. Lesley (pictured above, centre) explains more about her role providing practical, emotional and social support for New Zealanders with advanced breast cancer.

"As a Sweet Louise Support Coordinator, I establish ongoing, personal relationships with members through regular email and phone contact as well as home, hospital and clinic visits," says Lesley. "I also host member meetings, which bring groups of members together for peer-to-peer support.

"We help with social isolation, connect people, and let our members know that they are not alone.

"My background in nursing has helped me understand some of the bigger issues at stake for our members. My nursing philosophy has always been grounded in 'presencing', which requires deliberate, focussed attention and receptivity to the other person.

"During my career, I have specialised in hospice palliative care provision. Through this, I am aware of the trajectories that advanced disease can take and the importance of advance care planning.

"This excerpt from Joy Cowley's poem The Bridge has greatly influenced my work over the years: "There are times in life when we are called to be bridges, not a great monument spanning a distance and carrying great loads of heavy traffic, but a simple bridge to help one person from here to there over some difficulty such as pain, fear, grief, loneliness, a bridge which opens the way for an ongoing journey."

"My role as a Sweet Louise Support Coordinator enables me to act as a very simple bridge, supporting members with their ongoing journey.

"I get the absolute privilege of journeying alongside our amazing members, who every day show courage, resilience and compassion for others, even in the face of adversity. I get to listen, talk, laugh with members – and know that what Sweet Louise does makes a real difference.

"I also love the welcome card that new Sweet Louise members receive when they join us. It says:

"Friendship is born at that moment when one person says to another, 'What! You too? I thought I was the only one'." (C.S. Lewis).



Fantastic news as Ibrance and Kadcyla are funded

In May 2019, Sweet Louise stood alongside our members and other cancer organisations at a Parliamentary Select Committee hearing to lobby for the funding of the life-prolonging breast cancer treatments Ibrance and Kadcyla.

Our members also presented a petition with 34,000 signatures to support their call.

After years of campaigning, we heard the fantastic news in December 2019 that Pharmac will publicly fund Kadcyla. In March 2020, it was announced that Ibrance will also now be funded.

Both the first line and second line Ibrance

treatments will be funded, making New Zealand one of the first countries in the world to offer this treatment.

Access to targeted treatments, which enable patients to live well and for longer without their disease progressing, has the potential to make a huge difference to the quality of life of New Zealanders with advanced breast cancer.


