October – Breast Cancer Awareness Month

Thank you for standing alongside us during October, which is a significant month for Sweet Louise and for women and men with incurable breast cancer. October is Breast Cancer Awareness Month and 13 October is Metastatic Breast Cancer Day.

Metastatic cancer, also known as incurable, advanced or stage 4 cancer, means the cancer has spread from the breast to other parts of the body. At this stage, the cancer is no longer curable, but it can be treated. It is possible to live for many years with incurable breast cancer, though it does mean facing an uncertain future of ongoing treatments, fatigue, fear and anxiety – which is why our help and support is so vital. There isn't a moment to lose.

No one can change a diagnosis of incurable cancer.

Yet by taking part in Sweet October, you bring hope, inspiration and strength to help Kiwis with incurable breast cancer live as well as possible, for as long as possible. Even with family and healthcare professionals around them, Kiwis diagnosed with incurable breast cancer may find themselves isolated, scared and lacking vital support. Thanks to you, Sweet Louise can provide the specialist care and compassion they need.

The funds your raise through your Sweet October tea party will help provide the practical, emotional and financial support Kiwis with incurable breast cancer need, including:

- Specialised, personal, one-to-one care from a local Support Coordinator
- Face-to-face and online support groups, providing vital peer support
- Support with ready-made meals and home help
- Vouchers for self-care services such as massages and other well-being treatments
- Emergency support for when the hidden costs of cancer become too much, such as petrol costs to make it to hospital visits, to pay for GP visits, or to buy food for the family
- Family Time service, to enable families the chance to spend quality time together and create precious memories for families with young children.

Key Facts

Sweet Louise is the only charitable organisation in New Zealand dedicated to supporting women and men living with incurable breast cancer.

730+Sweet Louise currently supports over 730 Kiwis and their families with incurable breast cancer right across New Zealand.

3000 Approximately 3000 men and women are diagnosed with breast cancer each year.

30% Almost 30% of people diagnosed with primary breast cancer will go on to develop incurable breast cancer. 2 years ^{Once} diagnosed

with incurable breast cancer, the average life expectancy in New Zealand is less than two years. Whilst the cancer cannot be cured, in many cases, it is treatable. With the right care and support, people with incurable breast cancer can continue to live a positive and productive life.

50%+ Over half of the women Sweet Louise supports are under the age of 59 and many of them have children under the age of 18.

200+ Each year we hold over 200 meetings across NZ so women can connect with each other for vital peer-to-peer support.

In January 2020, 33-year-old teacher Nikki Black found out that her breast cancer had spread to her bones, making it incurable, but treatable. Nikki lives in Auckland with her partner and her two girls – Keira, age 11, and Alisha, age 8.

"In November 2019 I was busy with term four activities when I woke up one night and felt a lump. At first the news sounded OK – the cancer can be cured. But then the oncologist found areas of concern on my scan. By January, I had the diagnosis that the cancer had spread to my bones. My only option was treatment to keep the cancer at bay.

I went from completely normal to incurable cancer in a couple of months"

"Telling my kids was the hardest thing I've ever had to do. I'd told them about the initial breast cancer and that the lump could be cut out. I reassured them with information and leaflets. And then – the heartbreak on their faces when I told them the cancer had spread.

"I explained there was no cure, but that I would still be around for a while. At first, Alisha wouldn't leave my side. She said: 'I can't go out and play mummy, I have to be here in case you don't wake up'.

"I have good days and bad days. Some days I think I can't do this anymore. But each day when I wake up I am thankful and try to stay active. But I never plan far ahead.

"I found Sweet Louise on the internet and thought – these people know exactly what I am going through. Sweet Louise is wonderful. My Support Coordinator, Jenny, is amazing. Joining Sweet Louise is one of the best decisions I have ever made.

"I have a death sentence hanging over my head and at the meetings I can connect with people going through the same thing as me. I really enjoy that camaraderie and support. I can listen and learn from others. That helps me work out different strategies to cope and what is best for me.

Control To all those who support Sweet Louise – thank you really isn't enough. Your support eases my stress at a very tough time. Having people to talk to gives me the energy to keep going, to keep on fighting."

Make your fundraising go further

Shout about it

Brand it up

Ask your employer Some organisations will match the money you raise. It's a great

way to **double your money**. Check with your employer or HR department to find out if that's something they offer.

Your donations at work

Let people know how their donations to your event will help Kiwis with incurable breast cancer. \$50 can provide a freezer full of ready-made meals for a mum struggling with ongoing treatment or fatigue. Or \$200 can provide a special day trip for a family to create precious memories that children will treasure forever.

Thank everyone who has supported you. Let them know their donation has been noticed and appreciated. Thank them by email, social media or send them a thank you message through your fundraising page.

Tips to boost your online fundraising

- 1. Personalise your fundraising page and include your event details and any extra activities you are doing for fun.
- 2. Add photos and give updates to *keep everyone engaged*. You could share recipe ideas or let your guests know how they can contribute.
- 3. Tell people why you're raising funds for Sweet Louise and let them know where their

donations will go. Visit sweetlouise.co.nz/sweetoctober and share the stories and videos so your supporters can see for themselves what a difference they are making.

4. Post about your fundraising on social media – and make sure you tag @ sweetlouiseNZ on Facebook and Instagram and use the hashtags #sweetoctober #sweetoctobernz #sweetlouise

- 5. Don't be modest if you're getting close to your target, why not increase it and see if you can raise even more?
- 6. Share your page on social media and remind people by posting the progress of your event.
- 7. Be sure to include the link to your fundraising page in everything you do!

Sweet Louise Cake

Thanks to Christine Healy for creating this special Sweet Louise cake recipe especially for you!

For the base:

- 105g butter
- 85g castor sugar
- 3 egg yolks
- 200g flour
- 1tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp vanilla essence

In a cake mixer, cream the butter and sugar until pale then add the vanilla essence. Add the egg yolks one at a time and mix well. Gradually add the dry ingredients and mix until well combined. Line a 18cm x 28cm slice tin with baking paper and press the base mixture in using your fingertips. It can be quite a sticky mix so sometimes dipping your fingers into flour can help to press the mixture in evenly.

For the middle:

- ³⁄₄ cup raspberry jam
- ½ cup frozen raspberries thawed

Mash the raspberries with a fork and mix into the jam. Spread over the base.

For the meringue topping.

- 3 egg whites
- 175g castor sugar
- 50g fine coconut
- 35g thread coconut
- 1 tsp vanilla essence

In a cake mixer, whip the egg whites until soft peaks form then gradually add sugar and beat for about 5 minutes. Fold in the vanilla essence, fine and thread coconuts, and gently spread over base.

Bake at 180C for about 30 minutes or until meringue is lightly browned. Makes 12 pieces.
